Course Objective**Material Covered:**

Students will be introduced to the basic medical and surgical care of ophthalmic patients in the outpatient clinical setting. They will have the hands-on opportunity to learn basic ophthalmic examination techniques in a supervised faculty setting. Student will learn diagnosis and treatment of eye diseases as well as observe and assist in surgery, attend conferences, and have the opportunity to take part in clinical ophthalmic research.

Skills Acquired:

Use of basic ophthalmic equipment, including slit lamp, direct/indirect ophthalmoscope; assist in the workup outpatients under the supervision of staff/residents; develop a working knowledge of clinical and surgical ophthalmic instruments, learn disease management to become a well-rounded physician aware of ophthalmic diseases and emergencies

How Is Student Evaluated:

34% written exam, 33% presentation, and 33% averaged written evaluations. A score of 79% or below is a failing grade on the written exam; failing the exam automatically means failing the course. Faculty evaluations will be based upon attendance and participation in didactic sessions and clinical duties.

Unique Features Of This Elective:

This elective offers the opportunity to work closely with faculty ophthalmologists and residents observing and treating eye diseases in a busy ambulatory care setting. The goal is to give the student practical knowledge and to learn basic exam skills in ophthalmology.
